

Finding community at the library



When Frank Paloucek retired from teaching pharmacy at the University of Illinois-Chicago in January 2022, he suddenly found he had a lot of free time that he struggled to fill.

He tried his hand at gardening but it didn't take long to discover his hand didn't come with a green thumb. He tried golf, but that didn't work out either. He freely admitted he is too competitive to find the sport relaxing.

Around this time, Frank, an IPPL cardholder since moving to Willowbrook in 2021, learned that an adult Dungeons & Dragons club was starting up at IPPL. He'd played the game back in the early 1980s, so he was interested in restarting it.

"At my job I was always surrounded by people all the time," said Frank, who regularly worked with a group of 12 students each year in the residency program. "For me being retired, playing Dungeons & Dragons fit my need to be among other people doing something we all enjoy."

An avid reader, he loved IPPL from the start. "I've been to 20-25 libraries over the years looking for books, and this is a very nice library. I'm here at least every two weeks getting books."

And, even though he loves his routine of scooping up his favorite books from IPPL, he has more programs on his list, including the book discussion groups. He's also planning to spend time in IPPL's Maker Studio.



IPPL fosters success in local teens

Rebecca Williams is the kind of student who takes an AP Psychology class just for fun while Zahra Ali is the kind of student to ask a librarian for permission to study when she's attending an event that will honor her and others for their prize-winning creative writing.

Rebecca, a senior at Hinsdale South, and Zahra, a sophomore at Downers Grove South, have been IPPL cardholders for as long as they can remember. They are both highly motivated students who find comfort at the library.

For Rebecca, the library provides a break from the usual disruptions at home and a reprieve from her younger brother. She regularly visits the library after school, which is just a short walk along Clarendon Hills Road.

"The library is a space I have where I can sit and work and be comfortable," Rebecca said. "I come here to study, but I'm so glad I can also access so many books and so much information. I really got into Stephen King books so it's nice that I can read them at the library."

Zahra speaks fondly of her early memories of coming to IPPL as a child. She remembers coming to IPPL for family storytimes and other kids' programs.

"This place is so special for me," Zahra said. "I loved the family storytimes and all the programs for kids that I went to. The librarians are all so sweet. Now, I love to volunteer here when I have time and help with the family programs because I enjoyed them so much as a little kid."



These days Zahra is more likely to use the meeting spaces in the library rather than attend programs. The second-floor conference rooms come in extra handy for her when she's working on a group project or meeting with friends.

"The rooms are really nice for collaborating with friends and classmates," she said. "We can talk and work on a project without interrupting or bothering other people in the library. And I love the whiteboards in the rooms!"

To cap things off, Rebecca and Zahra were both winners in last fall's Write-On competition, sponsored by the Gift of Carl Foundation. They both love to write. Rebecca favors short stories, while Zahra enjoys writing poetry. While this honor is just among the many accolades they have each received in their high school careers so far, we have a feeling these two are going to go far. But, no matter what, IPPL will always be home.

Feeling Inspired in the Maker Studio

When Linda Painter gave birth to her twin daughters, she received a gift of embroidered towels with her daughters' names on them. But, these weren't your typical baby towels, they were towels her daughters could grow with as they were full-sized, hooded towels.

Inspired by that thoughtful gift, Linda pulled out her own sewing machine (a gift from her mother when she graduated college) and replicated the thoughtful gift for a friend's new baby. She sewed the baby name using the zig-zag method on her sewing machine. As each new baby was born, she made a towel.

Fast-forward, and now Linda has a new tool in her arsenal in getting these towels made: IPPL's Maker Studio.

"Using the embroidery machine, I can stitch a name quickly and add accents," said Linda. "I added mountains to a towel for a baby named Brecken. It really made it pop."



But, it's not just her famous towels that Linda enjoys using the Maker Studio for (see photo for one in progress). In fact, she's makes gifts that "no one else can replicate," adding a personal touch to nearly everything. She etches wine glasses for new bride and grooms, make ornaments for friends, and creates mugs to remember trips.



"The only thing I need is more time," said Linda, a long-time Darien resident.

Linda talks passionately about the Maker Studio to everyone she can. She jokes that she lives in the library, and wanted to say "thank you." She recently made a \$5,000 donation to the library to benefit the Maker Studio.

"It's the least I can do—I wanted to give back to the place that has helped me do so much in capturing special memories for my family and friends," said Linda.

And, when she's not in the Maker Studio, playing tennis with her friends, or volunteering her time, she's taking photographs. Her art will be featured in the library's gallery later this year.
